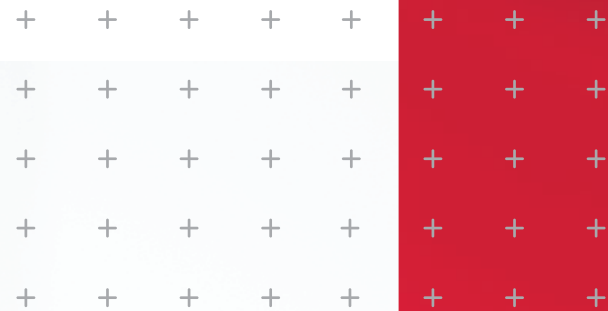

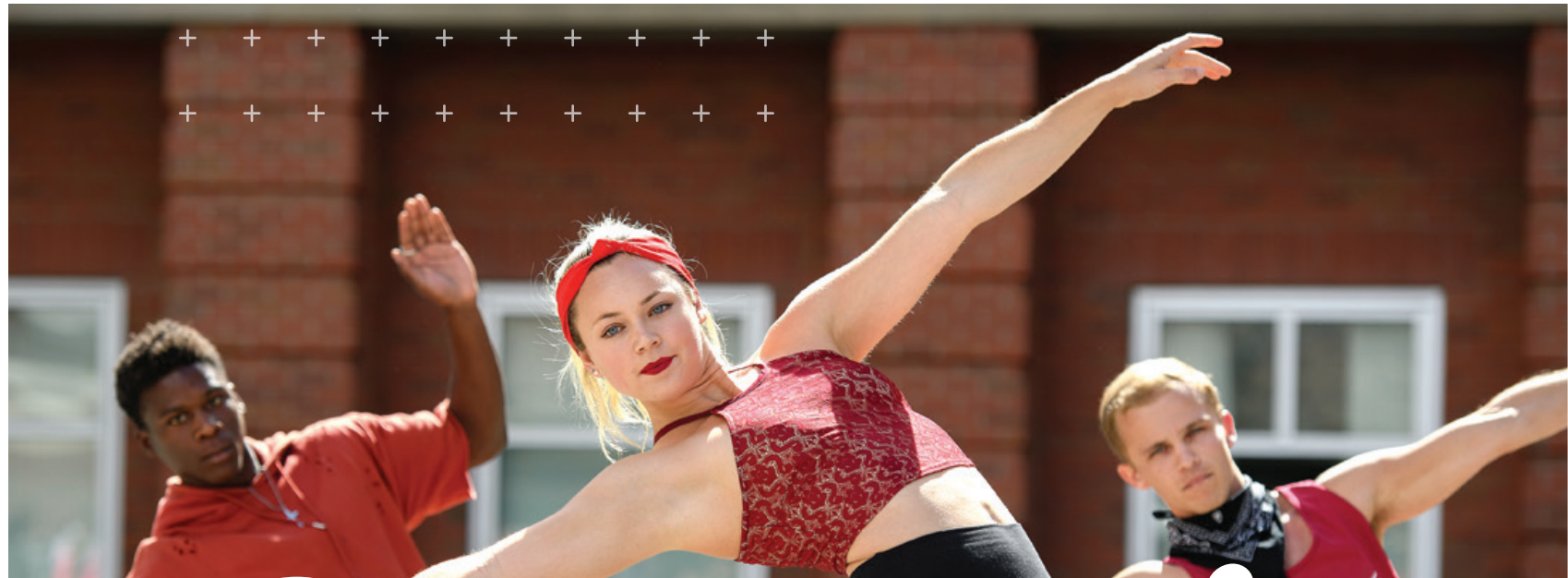

WASHINGTON APPLICATION FOR STATE FINANCIAL AID (WASFA)

Qualifying undocumented students and other select applicants from Washington state should submit the WASFA by January 31 to determine their state financial aid eligibility, including grants, work-study, and general scholarships. wsac.wa.gov/wasfa

SCHOLARSHIPS

We can help. WSU offers a variety of awards based on both merit and need, including those listed below.

For maximum consideration, you must complete your admission requirements (application, fee, and transcripts) and the WSU General Scholarship Application by January 31. You can also search for thousands of additional scholarships, both at WSU and from other organizations, at scholarships.wsu.edu.

WASHINGTON RESIDENT SCHOLARSHIPS

- **Distinguished University Achievement Award** – Awarded to Washington resident students with a minimum 3.8 unweighted high school GPA - \$4,000 per year for two years.
- **University Achievement Award** – Awarded to Washington residents with an unweighted high school GPA between 3.6-3.79 - \$2,000 per year for two years.
- **Cougar Commitment** – WSU has committed to covering tuition and mandatory fees for most Washington residents who could not otherwise afford to attend. To see if you may be eligible for this award, visit financialaid.wsu.edu/cougar-commitment.
- **Regents Scholars program** – High School Counselors in Washington are invited to nominate up to two of their top students for this scholarship program. Talk to your high school counselor or see the Regents Scholars web page for information about eligibility and nominations. admission.wsu.edu/regents-scholarship
- **Crimson Transfer Award** – Awarded to WSU Pullman transfer students meeting the transferable credit requirements with a minimum transfer GPA of 3.2 - \$2,000 per year for up to three years.

NON-RESIDENT SCHOLARSHIPS

- **Western Undergraduate Exchange/Distinguished Cougar Award** – Awarded to out-of-state first-year students with a minimum 3.4 unweighted high school GPA - \$11,000 per year, renewable for up to an additional three years.
- **Cougar Award** – Awarded to out-of-state first-year students with an unweighted high school GPA between 3.0-3.39 - \$7,000 per year, renewable for up to an additional three years.
- **Transfer Western Undergraduate Exchange (Cougar Award for Transfers)** – Awarded to an out-of-state transfer student meeting the transferable credit requirements with a minimum transfer GPA of 3.0.

COLLEGE ACADEMIC DISTRIBUTION REQUIREMENTS (CADRS)

To be eligible for admission, you will need to complete high school courses in these areas. Confirm course eligibility at cadr.wsu.edu.

English	4 years
Mathematics (must include Algebra II or Integrated Math III)	3 years
Senior year math-based quantitative course	1 year
Examples: statistics, advanced level of applied math, math-based career and technical courses, chemistry, physics, etc. Students who have completed math beyond Algebra II or Integrated Math III, prior to the senior year, are exempt from this requirement.	
Social sciences	3 years
Science (must include two years of lab courses including one algebra-based course)	3 years
World languages	2 years
Arts	1 year (or an additional year of any other course above)
